

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PARLIAMENT OF WORLD RELIGIONS





On November 2nd, your Board hosted the FEZANA delegates attending the 7th Parliament of World's Religions (PoWR) held in Toronto. We took the opportunity to host the delegates of the World Zarathushti Chamber of Commerce (Toronto Chapter). Phil Sidhwa, our PWAC Chair provided an update on the Place of Worship project to the FEZANA delegates attending the Parliament from across North America. We also had Edul Daver, Global WZCC President, Father Tommy and Armene Modi, founder of Ashta-No-Kai address our WZCC delegates on entrepreneurship and what it takes to succeed in the business world, and how charities working with business continue to have a positive impact on the lives of the less fortunate.



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RELIGIOUS & LECTURE COMMITTEE





On December 15, the R&L Committee organized two lectures – one by Ervad Kobad Zarolia and the second by Ervad Tehemton Mirza.

Ervad Kobad presented a **Photographic Journey of Uzbekistan**, which as Persian history is part of **AIRYANA VAEJA** – the original land of the Persians. He visited Uzbekistan in 2017 and talked about his travails through various cities and towns. Although the Uzbeks are predominantly Muslim, they are aware of their Zoroastrian roots. Numerous archaeological sites have revealed Zoroastrian artifacts.

Ervad Tehemton's talk was on **Live Your Prayers**. He believes Zoroastrianism is a way of life; Zoroastrians are expected not just to say or chant their prayers, but to understand them, learn from them and, most importantly, live them. Zoroastrian prayers are uniquely practical; rather than just praising God, our basic prayers preach values. The Ashem Vohu and Yathā Ahu Vairyō prayers are statements of truth and wisdom – an Instruction Manual for a Good Life.



RELIGIOUS EVENTS

On December 16, thirteen Ontario mobeds got together to form an informal body – **Ontario Mobeds Advisory Committee (OMAC)**. The main purpose of OMAC is to provide a uniform response by mobeds to queries on religious matters. The following Mandate was accepted by the Mobeds present:

- OMAC will act as an informal advisory body to their respective associations (OZCF and ZSO)
- OMAC to restrict its scope to issues related to the day to day operations and procedural matters of
 their respective associations (e.g. queries and frequencies of communal ceremonies like Jashans,
 Gahambars, Muktad, religious education and dissemination, etc.). Matters would be referred to
 NAMC where further clarification or input is needed
- All broader and larger policy issues like standardization of Navjote, Weddings, Death ceremonies
 etc., interpretations, representing NA Mobeds and other issues that relate to NA Mobeds and
 Mobedyars in general shall be beyond the scope of this OMAC and be left to NAMC

OMAC will draw up a list of common queries which mobeds receive and provide a uniform response.

These queries & responses will be uploaded on the OZCF & ZSO websites for reference by the anjuman like a list of FAQs.

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THE STORY OF ZOROASTRIANISM

The Zoroastrian or Mazdayasni religion is one of the most ancient religions of the world, originating at a similar time to the Vedic religion. It is believed that Zoroastrianism influenced other Western religions such as Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Still practised today, it was the pre-Islamic religion of Iran and the Middle East. It survives all over the world, with populations in India, UK, North America, Europe, Iran and Australia.

Origin:

The prophet Zarathustra was born into the Spitama clan either in North-East Iran or North-West Afghanistan. All we know about him is documented in his poems, called the Gathas. Zoroaster had several visions when he was thirty. Inspired by these spiritual experiences, he began to teach that there was only one God and ask followers to live by the basic principles of Humata (good thoughts), Hukhta (good words) and Huvarshta (good deeds). Many rejected his teachings in the early days, but his cousin Madhyoma had faith in him. The local religious heads and officials opposed him as they dreaded losing their authority over ceremonies and rituals. After many years of fruitless persuasion and trials, he felt disheartened and left home. Eventually his philosophy got support from the Bactrian King Vishtaspa. The King and the Queen became followers and gave his teachings official recognition as the religion of their kingdom. Zarathustra died at an advanced age, in his 70s. His religion spread throughout Iran and was the religion of three ancient Iranian empires the Achaemenid Empire (c.550–330 BCE), the Arsacid Empire (250 BCE-261 CE) and the Sassanian empire (261 CE-641 CE Though in today's Iran, Zoroastrian presence is small, its influence continues due to its former dominance for thousands of years. It can be seen in the Greater Iran's heritage reflected in Iranian festivals and the customs.

Theology:

Zoroastrian belief is that there is only one universal transcendent God, Ahura Mazada or the 'Wise Lord'. In its tradition, there are two opposing principles: 'Bounteous Principle' referred to as "Spenta Mainyu" and 'Destructive Principle' referred to as "Angra Mainyu" or "Ahirman". This faith is believed to be 'the world's ecological religion' as it teaches to protect the nature. It strongly advises followers to remain active in life doing good deeds as the path to happiness. This active involvement is central to the concept of free will. Ahura Mazda will finally triumph over evil, through the free choice of humans and there will be cosmic renovation of the universe. Sacred Text: The Avesta is the religious text of the Zoroastrians containing the scriptures. It was orally transmitted with the help of written texts in some ancient non-phonetic script and finally written down in a phonetic script, the Avesta script, which was invented in the Sassanian period. During the Sassanian period the Avesta literature was translated, summarized and commented upon in Pahlavi, the language of the Sassanian period. Very little of the Avesta and Pahlavi literature survives today. The Gathas, the Yasna, the Visperad and the Vidvedat and the Khordeh Avesta are important parts of the Avesta literature still surviving.

Practices:

Zoroastrians routinely pray in presence of some form of fire. Both fire and water are considered important for sustaining life and are found in a fire temple. They also cover their head during prayer, like Jewish people. The initiation into the faith, called the Navjoe (Sudreh Pushi) is like the Bar (or Bat)- Mitzvah in the Jewish faith. Both boys and girls undergo the Navjote. Funeral practise: The Tower of Silence is a place where traditionally a dead human body is left for ritual exposure. It is still practised in parts of India. Other Zoroastrian communities follow cremation or burial.



THE STORY OF ZOROASTRIANISM (CONTINUED)

Migration:

The end of the Sasanian Empire by the invasion of Muslim Arabs, ended Zoroastrian rule of Iran. A period of continuous persecution of non-Muslim Iranians decimated the Zoroastrian population in Iran. Zoroastrians sought refuge in Northern Iranian mountains and in the regions of Yazd. Finally, for survival, some migrated in about the year 900 AD. Many sailed to Gujarat in India. Their descendants are called the Parsis or Parsees. There are small groups of Zoroastrians in Central Asia, the Caucasus and as expatriates they are in the developed countries such as the USA, Canada, UK and Australia. Parsees and India: They first arrived in Diu in Kathiawar and then at Sanjan in Gujarat. They lived in the Gujarat region for almost eight centuries, busy with agriculture and various trades. The big change occurred after Gujarat became part of British India. They prospered under British rule and started various industries, and became prosperous as lawyers, doctors and successful businessmen and women. They contributed to giant industries in diverse fields, from steel to software, aviation to hospitality, which flourished based on their ethical business practices. They used their wealth for social welfare creating institutions like Institute of Science in Bengaluru, Children Hospital and Cancer Hospital at Parel, Institute for the Fundamental Research, Institute for Social Science and many others all over India. India's development owes much to Parsee families, including the Tatas, the Godrejs, the Wadias etc. Compared to the size of their community which is just 0.006% of India's population in 2011, the Zoroastrian contribution has no parallel!

Demographics:

Going by a survey of 2004 the world-wide population of the Zoroastrians was between 124,000 to 190,000 with about 57,000 in India in 2011 (census). Due to the low birth rate and the immigration trend, their number in India may drop to 23000 by 2020. Another contributing factor is opposition to proselytizing. Persian Zoroastrians allow conversion and their centres are active in this regard.
