The World Zoroastrian Organisation

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The raging floods have swept away houses in the semi-urban areas, wreaked havoc on the buildings in the city, destroyed warehouses containing food grains & other essential commodities. There is a severe shortage of even drinking water and milk.

The flood waters began to recede from 10th August 2006, but have left in their wake, acute despair and distress. The first signs of water borne diseases have also begun to manifest, which will accentuate the suffering even further.

As soon as the flood water began to recede, WZO, through its volunteers, based at Navsari were amongst the first to reach the affected areas on 11th August 2006. The task of providing relief to some of the Parsis affected by the calamity has already commenced.

WZO has established contact with the local leaders at Surat. The first consignment of essential items, such as drinking water, milk powder, pulses, grains, oil and other commodities such as potatoes, onions, tomatoes etc has already been distributed. The second consignment has been organized and will be dispatched as soon as we hear from the team in Surat.

Some areas are still under 2 '/2 to 3 feet under water and are not accessible. It has been estimated that many more such consignments will be required to provide succour and relief to the members of our community.

At present we are focusing only on providing relief to community members affected by nature's fury. It is only after the situation returns to some form of normalcy, will it be possible for us to assess the actual extent of damage to property and the rehabilitation that will be required to be undertaken to get our affected brethren back on their feet.

Massive funding will be necessary to meet these humanitarian objectives. The WZO appeals to individuals and institutions to lend a helping hand by making funds available generously for the relief and rehabilitation of the poor Zoroastrian affected by nature's fury.

Annual General Meeting and the Extra Ordinary Annual General Meeting

On July 23, 2006, the new board of directors was voted in. What made the AGM special was the fact that it was held at the ZRCC. The meeting started with a short prayer by Nozer Kotwal, followed by an Extra Ordinary General Meeting (EOGM), which then led into the Annual General Meeting (AGM).

The EOGM was called in accordance with By-Law 5.2.2 to allow the membership of the OZCF to consider and vote on the following change to By-Law 6.3 of the OZCF.

The current by-law stated that "all retiring Directors shall be eligible for re-election – limited to 3 terms in lifetime unless there are no other nominations. No Executive officer shall hold same office for more than 1 term at a time, unless there are no other nominations". This was voted upon and changed to "all retiring Directors shall be eligible for re-election – limited to 3 consecutive terms, (with no lifetime limitation) unless there are no other nominations. No Executive officer shall hold same office for more than 1 term at a time, unless there are no other nominations".

Phil Sidhwa opened the discussion to the floor and encouraged the membership to air their views regarding this by-law before voting. Many members voiced their opinions, for and against, and then voted via the ballot process, resulting in the by-law being changed.

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) then proceeded once all matters at the EOGM were resolved. Phil Sidhwa outlined many outstanding moments of the past year in the "President's Report", including the purchase of the land, monies raised thus far, and our inaugural Jashan where we welcomed over 600 attendees. All these were received with great pride and loud and joyous applause.

Several topics were discussed by all and voted upon, one being the increase in membership fees. The Membership Committee proposed a change to the membership fees as a response to many members voicing their comments at the 2005 AGM.

Several members took the opportunity to express their feelings and gratitude to the exiting board members with some very touching words. Marzi Byramjee spoke about Phil Sidhwa and how he spent endless hours in getting the town of Oakville to accept our preliminary plan for the future of the ZRCC. Khurshid Engineer spoke about the rest of the board including the hard work, contribution and great dedication of Marzi Byramjee, Nozer Kotwal, Phil Sidhwa and Gulrukh Patel. Putli Mirza stood up and was pleasantly surprised to see "such young" people come forward and show such enthusiasm to run for a position on the board of directors and Kersi Cooper expressed some heartfelt words for the board which echoed those of the community.

CAMP Z-ROCK By Sonya Anklesaria

Recently, our great Girl Guide Leader, Armaity Aunty (Anandasagar), with the help of three great leaders: Teenaz Javat, Yasmin Menon and Nergish Khandke organized a four day camp from August 24-27. After giving some thought and wondering what to name the camp, the junior leaders hit upon this idea and called it "Camp Z-Rock". This camp was for Zoroastrian youth between the ages of 6 and 12. Sure, planning and organization took a lot of hard work and concentration (and even some doubts) as in planning any other event. But all the hard work paid off in the end. Everyone had a blast and young and old alike has a great time. It all pulled together beautifully and was totally worth the time spent, thanks to the joint efforts of all concerned.

There was a head count of about twenty children - each child more adorable and fun to hang around with than the other. Headcount was taken every so often throughout the weekend, to make sure, we were not missing anyone!! What was fascinating was how, in just a few days, each child and volunteer bonded so well and developed an amazing rapport and became close one another, more like siblings than friends. Surprisingly, there were no fights, no tantrums, no missing home and no teasing anyone!!

The first day of camp, tarps were put up, tents were pitched, name tags were distributed and the kids were put in groups (Red, White and Maroon). As the children arrived at various times, and were settling in, Armaity Aunty demonstrated to them the "art of Tie Dying", the first activity of Camp Z-Rock. She had bought white cotton shirts and we were going tie/dye them by putting rubber bands around and all over them. Thereafter, everyone assembled and rules of the camp were detailed for the four days, and the kids were given a site orientation tour. Then they were shown to their "posh accommodations" (tents) and were introduced to their little "tent buddies", followed by a craft making session and snacks. Later in the night, a Bollywood movie was set up for the kids to enjoy - "Koi Mil Gaya" (on the lines of the famous Hollywood movie, ET), a movie which most of the kids had seen before, yet being a favourite, was enjoyed by all. Of course, the regular trimmings of party mix and juice/milk had to be given, to make the 'movie experience' complete. Halfway through the movie, it was time to call it a day. Prayers were said, roll calls were done the children were tucked in for the day (who took a long, long LONG time to get tucked in!!!!). But just as our heads were about to hit the pillow, they all came untucked and we were afraid the neighbour's cows would be disturbed.

The next morning, being Khordad Saal, the camp awoke bright and early. It had rained in the night and tarps were drooping over our tents. But that did not curb the enthusiasm of the kids. After breakfast, we got ready for the the Khordad Saal prayers being held at the ZRCC. During the prayers, Nousheen Bastani (one of the Junior leaders) and I noticed some of the kids (mainly boys) dozing off - this was however not surprising at all due the fact that they were creating a ruckus the night prior - switching tents, play fighting and annoying each other and refusing to settle down. After the prayers and dhan dar, the whole camp put on their sharp new tie-dyed shirts (something new to wear on Khordad Saal) (thanks to Taila Anandasagar and her friend Amanda, for dying and unbanding them, and Uncle Raj (Menon) for making trips to dry them in several batches) and off we went, bathing suits and all, for fun swim to the Erin Centre Community pool. What a blast everybody had - the highlight of the swim being able to swing from the Tarzan rope on to the water and playing with water toys provided. That same evening, after dinner, the Junior Leaders put on some music and let the kids hang loose - dance around, talk with their friends or plain chill. About an hour later, another volunteer, Dara (uncle) Wadia, set up a campfire, around which Fairy Rings were made and digested quickly and songs were sung. "Campfire was definitely my favorite part of camp," was the most popular quote of Camp Z-Rock! Once the fire had died out, the kids were given milk, the incomplete Bollywood movie was finished and there ended yet another awesome day.

Saturday morning, after breakfast, Mahiyar (Panthaky) came and organized some outdoor games for a morning of active living!!! They partook in a pizza lunch and watched their kids display the group talents - songs and dances which had been performed at campfire, the night before - which was thoroughly enjoyed by all present. The much anticipated award ceremony at the end of the weekend brought out smiles and laughs from the kids and parents alike. Each child was recognized in some way and given an award to remember their camp days by. This was followed by Nergish aunty cutting a cake for her birthday, and then finally - as all good things have to come to an end - Good-byes = (. Many a tear was shed and lots of hugs exchanged!

To conclude, I would like to say that Camp Z-Rock was a ROARING success. This was an amazing experience and I would be honoured to volunteer my time, time and again. I would also like to extend a BIG thank you to Armaity Aunty, Teenaz Aunty, Yasmin Aunty and Nergish Aunty for organizing a terrific camp. Compliments go to the chef, Nergish Aunty, (who got the QM Xtraordinaire Award) for preparing excellent meals and snacks every single day. And also a big thanks to Dara Uncle for putting up with the children and never letting any task daunt him. Thanks to all the volunteers who helped during the camp. Thanks also go out to Farokh and Rustom Patel, Khushroo Bharda, Raj Menon, Gautam Khandke and Mahaveer Javat for helping out in setting up and running of the camp. Thanks also to Niloufer Bhesania, Xerxes Bamji, Xerxes Wania and Bahram Parsi for sponsoring some of the activities and equipment for the camp. It was greatly appreciated. I do hope that we can do this again next year, and have double the fun!








Youth Variety Program-What a Huge Success!



"[Note: The following are my personal feelings and views on this topic and in no way reflect the views of the other committee members, although, I have been encouraged to voice my concerns and disappointment over the past talent show. Being labeled as a 'youth' of the community, I have kept my thoughts to myself, but I know that there are other youth that share them.]

"I am sure you are all aware that we cannot do anything in this world without support. As a mature youth, I am finding that while my need for support networks are increasing, my own personal ability to be able to provide and show support is growing. When asked to help organize the youth variety program (YVP), I jumped at the chance. Not only would I be able to work with my friends to organize this event, and work with kids but in the true spirit of being a Parsee, I would be able to do something charitable and help raise some money for the OZCF. When the idea of the OZCF property started, it was, from my understanding, to create a place that would not only house a place of worship for the Zoroastrian community, but it would be a place that the youth of the Zoroastrian community could come together, hang out, and eventually(in the back of your minds) expand our dwindling community.

Why wouldn't I want to support this idea! However, when the YVP committee and I began discussing the talent show, we came to realize that this use of the property was, in fact, not for us, but for the even younger youth. Since the majority of us are in our early to mid 20's, by the time the property is up and fully running, most of us (and I hate to say this), will be married and maybe even starting families of our own. Our primary goal was that the talented youth who chose to participate in this event would not only be able to perform and display their talents, but more importantly, meet other Zoroastrians, make new friendships and lasting memories, while fostering a sense of community involvement. So that when the community center is eventually built there will be a group who will have bonded, become friends and want to utilize and fulfill what our adult community is trying to achieve. The fundraising part of it was our secondary goal, but still played a major role; as at the end of the day the amount of money raised is essentially a marker of how much we support our community. (for some people).

As young adults we are asked to show support in what you, the adults, are trying to achieve, and we try to, to the best of our abilities. You also ask the youth to get more involved, we did, and after some hard work, we put together a fundraiser for something that we believed in. We then asked for your support, and we found that there was a VERY small response. I know speaking for myself, I found this very discouraging. I really noticed a different side of our community. I guess now that I have broken away from the shelter of being classified as a 'kid', I am exposed to reality. I was blinded by the facade of the galas, picnics and other fundraising events. I was blinded by the large sums of money being graciously and generously donated with a simple raise of a paddle or the signing of a cheque. We all thought, if our community can show so much support during fundraisers organized by the adults of the community, imagine the support we could receive when we arrange an event that is performed and run solely by the youth of the community, the future fundraisers, if you will. But as the day of the show grew closer and our ticket sales were still less than half of what we expected, our confidence began to dwindle. Thoughts of failure began running through our heads. What if we were not able to break even? How would we pay for the theatre? Do they really want to see our first fundraising attempt fail? WHERE WAS OUR SUPPORT WHEN WE NEEDED IT?

With the price of 30 dollars per ticket, our idea was that we would be covering the theatre, the food, and other costs that we would incur while having a small amount left over for the OZCF. We realized that it could be a problem for some families, especially with ALL of the fundraising events that have been going on during the summer months, it adds up. We understand. But we really thought that in providing the show and food afterwards, that we were giving value for money. (Go check out how much it costs to rent a theatre for a day!) Every year there are more and more fundraising events, and every year they are getting more and more expensive. When we were approached, however, to organize this event, we were lead to believe that we would get support from our community because we were the youth. And how could you not support your youth? Right?

Lately I feel that everything has become completely money driven and while it does make the world go round, everything comes with a price. At this point in time, fundraising is centre stage for the OZCF; however, as mentioned before it was our secondary goal. Our primary goal was our participants, getting them together in a fun situation, making new friends, while making them feel that they are doing something worthwhile towards their community. These kids worked so hard perfecting their skills and talents, coming up with a performance that they knew would amaze the audience. It can be pretty intimidating for a 6 year old to perform a solo on a large stage in front of an audience, and if they were going to put in the effort for us, we wanted to provide them a full auditorium that would appreciate their time, effort and talent. We had less than half of the auditorium full, and that was with some of the performers sitting in the audience while they were not performing. These are young kids, they are so proud of their talents (which they have every right to be), and when they want to show them off, we should be encouraging them not discouraging them! To prove my point further, I heard that some of the parents of the performers did not even come, as they felt they were not getting their money's worth. Throughout all the years that I performed various ballet and dance routines, I cannot imagine going on stage at a theatre and performing to an empty auditorium, the thought of not having my parents there to watch and encourage me never even entered my mind.

Regardless of the lack of support from our community, with the support of our immediate families, friends and mentors, we pushed through and we delivered a fantastic show. Despite the low ticket sales, due to the generosity of a few donors, we were able to contribute something to the OZCF. Many people have already commented that they cannot wait for the next show. Trust me there will be another. However, we have learned from this situation. We have learned not to procrastinate, that \$30 for a ticket is a lot of money, that the summer is not a good time for a fundraising event, that next time we should be able to do this without the help of adults, that there are politics in absolutely everything we do, but most of all we realized that if we are not going to get the support from our community then we will have to support a different organization. This way our primary goal of getting the youth together to create the friendships and memories will still be achieved and it will not be a west side story. The children from the east end will not be as reluctant to participate, as this year some did not participate due to the politics. This way we can also look outside of our community for support and donations and not have to depend on the same people to donate each time. We decided that since the talent show is performed and run solely by the 'kids', we should donate to a foundation that supports other kids. Kids helping kids. I cannot think of a better way to ingrain the importance of doing charitable work into the minds of our future.

There is a saying: "If you build it, they will come" but without support, you CAN build it... but will they be WILLING to come?"
