Khorshed Jamshed Mody, mother of Thrity Pfuetzner (Uwe) and Vera Mistry (Kersi), grandmother of Natasha, Cyrus (Roopa) and Kevin, great grandmother of Angad and Leah passed away on September 17, 2007. Our Grandmother was everyone's "Granny". She could steal her way into hearts as only a warmhearted grandmother could. She experienced hardship early in life, losing her Mother in childhood and becoming a widow at thirty-five. Despite this, her life was filled with happiness and good fortune. One never saw any evidence of suffering. Instead, it was her eagerness for travel, her wisdom and her charity that stood out. If she had five dollars in her pocket, she believed three should be for someone else. She loved her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, but had affection for all children. In a box in her bedroom she collected countless photos of the children she knew. They may have been cousins' children, or cousins' children's children. In her 85 years she touched and was touched by all of their lives. It is impossible to capture in words what this woman meant to us, but since her death, the words heard most often are: wise, compassionate, eager for experience, zest for life. She was patient and adaptable, she gave sound advice and she knew when to call a spade a spade. Most importantly, she lived her life till the end with eagerness and passion. Old age slowed her down, but it didn't temper her adventurous spirit. She still wanted to go everywhere everyone else was going and it appeared she was oblivious to her limitations.

At the age of 83 she cunningly enlisted me, her granddaughter, to take her to Paris. Naively, I let her convince me we could do a mini tour - slowly. We were wrong, but only I felt it was a mistake. It took her half an hour and two rest stops to simply exit the hotel's lobby. Finally, standing on the Paris street, just outside the hotel, Granny put her hand on her back and breathed a sigh of fatigue while I stood discouraged beside her. Granny mustered a big smile, raised her hand, and with her head cocked to one side said, "Toon chalti tha, hoon ounch" (you walk ahead, I'll catch up)!

The best way to honour and remember her is to live by the examples she set for us. To pass on the love she showed us, be good to the community we belong to, be honest with ourselves and others around us, and most importantly enjoy what life has to offer us. She passed away just as she said she wanted to. Not in a hospital bed, not in a nursing home, not bedridden, but still active and full of determination. Her death was extremely sudden and a close relative describes it best: "God didn't want her to know He was taking her away. Even that pain of parting, she didn't have to endure."

The Zoroastrian Association of Metropolitan Chicago was host to the 1st NG07 (NextGenNow) Workshop, from October 12 – 14, 2007 in conjunction with FEZANA/ZYNA. Keeping their faith's flame lit: Young Zoroastrians fear for the future of a religion that shaped other faiths By Ron Grossman, Tribune staff reporter, October 15, 2007

When a group of young Zoroastrian people gathered in a Chicago suburb over the weekend to plan and pray for their religion's survival, they sang a modern hymn of praise to their adopted homeland with a sentiment at the heart of their ancient faith.

Once, the Zoroastrian community numbered in the millions with its compass running from Greece through the Middle East to India. Now there are fewer -- perhaps far fewer -- than 200,000 Zoroastrians left worldwide, about 10,000 in the United States. Should that statistical decline continue, it could mean the end of a tradition influential far beyond its own boundaries: Zoroastrianism helped shape Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Yet most Americans would scarcely note its passing nor recognize the indebtedness of their own faith. "After 9/11, a boy in my high school asked if I was a Hindu, a Muslim or a terrorist," said Motafram, 20, a student at the University of Michigan who grew up in Milwaukee. In fact, she is none of those, belonging instead to a faith with a straightforward ethic: "Think good thoughts, say good words, do good deeds." Such was the teaching of the prophet Zarathustra, as explained in "My First Zoroastrian Prayer Book". The religious hymns Zarathustra composed and subsequent elaborations on his teaching answer a theological question perplexing too many faiths; If God is good, why does evil exist? The Zoroastrians' answer is that there is an evil divinity as well as a good one at work in the universe. Scholars of religion characterize Zoroastrianism as a dualism, contrasting it with the monotheism of some other faiths. Neville Vazifdar, a participant in the Burr Ridge conference, said he can't understand how others can resist his ancestors' answer to the existence of evil. "Every person, if he has a whit of sense, ought to see the logical necessity of dualism," said Vazifdar, 20, of Bolingbrook. "It's so simple, yet so complex." Vazifdar is a mobed, as the group's priests are called. "We're not fire worshipers, as some people think," said Vazifdar, an engineering student. "Fire is the symbol of the inner light we strive to realize."

'Sunset' if not the 'twilight' Farzin Avari, a student from Marietta, Ga., conducted a survey of the community and concluded, writing in Fezana Journal, the community's magazine, that "unless we sit up and do something, it could very well be the 'sunset' if not the 'twilight." Her census showed its membership fast declining in India and suggests its fate in the U.S. hangs in the balance. Forty-six percent of North American Zoroastrians marry outsiders, she found. Avari also put the demographic dilemma in personal terms. "I was the first Zoroastrian to graduate from my high school," said Avari, 18. "I'll probably be the last Zoroastrian to graduate from there too."
